University has an automated examination management system called ExamPro which handles all the pre and post examination activities that includes the use of barcode for dummy number, personalized answer sheets, OMR, registration, result processing etc. The research section is semi automated and it manages the online admission and fee collection. The finance section uses the Public Financial Management System (PFMS) for accounting the centrally sponsored funds. The University Department Section uses the PFMS for scholarship processing. A module for tracking the tappal has been developed and it is in the testing phase. Also a module for incorporating the staff details has been developed and it is in the final phase. A Foxpro software is available in the Establishment (Billing) section which is used for preparing the salary bill of the employees. Further inhouse development of the departmental automation is going on.

Feedback Obtained

The feedbacks are collected through structured questionnaires by the University and also by individual departments from the stakeholders. After careful analysis by the Department of Statistics, Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, the reports are given to the appropriate Individuals / Departments / Authorities for planning the activities for further developments. The contents of the reports are discussed in detail in order to evolve developmental strategies. The development activities are concentrated on Academic Content and Delivery, Students' / Scholars' Progression, and infrastructure development of the University. Academic Content and delivery: New courses, including vocational, are introduced based on the requirements in the society, industry, and entrepreneurial / employment market. The syllabi are revised based on the feedback of the alumni and employer. The teachers utilize the ICT technologies for conducting the academic activities to enhance the understanding of the students. Transparent Continuous Internal Assessment is being followed in all the University departments. Students' / Scholars' Progression: The first 10 meritorious students in each integrated programme are financially supported with Rs. 2000 per month by the University. Competitive coaching and remedial coaching become a part of the departmental activity. Industrial / Institutional visits and training are arranged by the departments based on the interest of the students for improving their employability. Apart from the regular departmental activities, departments are actively involved in intimating the opportunities for Skill Development, Training, Research, Employment, and Entrepreneurship. Students' Union is empowered to conduct programme for student progression under the guidance of Department of Youth Welfare. Invited talks are arranged on emerging fields to create awareness on opportunities. The university encourage research scholars by providing a scholarship of Rs. 5000 per month to one research scholar from each department in the name of Bharat Ratna Dr. M.G.Ramachandran fellowship to encourage the full time scholars. Scholars are given awareness on various funding bodies for research and are motivated to apply for the same. On request, the laboratory services are extended to the students, scholars, and researchers of other institutions. Infrastructural Development of the University: Library remote access facilities are extended to all faculties and students of University Departments for accessing e-journals. On request, the remote access facilities are also extended to the needed from affiliated colleges of our University. Based on the requests of the students and scholars the Wi-Fi trees are built in the campus with electrical and internet facilities. For the convenience of the day scholars the public bus services are extended in to the campus. Moreover, the scheduled trips by the University vehicles make the movements easier for hostellers and other members within the campus. To increase the environmental friendliness, the bicycles are made available for the students with in the campus. Based on the request, the health centre with dedicated staff and Ambulance service are made available at the campus for 24 X 7. Hostel infrastructure, including mess services, are refined periodically based on the feedback of the hostel residents.
